As we begin to shake off the quietude of the New Year, we in Mariposa are eagerly starting to gear up for what will certainly be a make-or-break midterm election. The November elections are only nine months away; we need to make sure this country offers a resounding 'NO' and an inarguable referendum to the inscrutable and desperately wrong agenda of Bush. After all: we in California sent a very clear message to Schwarzenegger last November and the people of America have an even more urgent message for Bush: No More War in Iraq, No More Illegal Wiretaps on American Citizens, No More Attacks on a Woman's Right To Choose, No More Devastation to our Environment, our Economy, our Pensions, our Seniors, our Healthcare, our Prescription Drugs....

As the bill must now pass through the Assembly by the end of January, you may know more about its ultimate fate as you read this than I did when I wrote it. We were also joined by T. J. Cox, notvet-formally-declared candidate for the 19th US Congressional District. T. J. will be our special guest speaker at the February 11th Meeting of the Mariposa Club; PLEASE call (209) 966-3367 as advance reservations are absolutely required.

Looking ahead, we're beginning the extensive planning for one of our biggest annual events, our Mariposa Democratic Club Jefferson Dinner. This year's event will be held on Saturday evening, April 8th and as always we'll have a great evening planned for you with a gourmet feast of a meal, speakers and, of course, plenty of great politics!

The December 2nd speaker was unable to attend, so President Ginny Terrell led the group in revising goals that were set at the April 2005 meeting.

Grow the Club: Members believe expanding membership should remain a top priority. Ideas were generated about who those new members might be, and how they might be recruited. Minority outreach toward Native Americans, Mexican Americans, East Indians, Gays and Lesbians, and Youth was seen as possible fertile ground for our efforts. A Community Outreach Committee composed of club members Nancy McPherson, Laare Rowan, and Norman Secker was formed to expand on these ideas. Current efforts to improve club visibility through the Mountain Heritage Days float, newspaper articles, bumper stickers, fair booths, scholarship, and union networking have proved effective and will continue.

Get Out the Vote: Through the able leadership of **Billie Cavin** and the help of many members, the club continues to set the standard for grassroots "GOTV" activity. This commitment was most recently demonstrated during the November proposition referendum. Another aspect of it, getting signatures to qualify candidates for ballots, is also Oakhurst Democratic Club (continued)

underway. The past GOTV efforts have been very successful and members want it to continue.

Improve Fundraising for Club Priorities: Every organization wants to raise funds, but the logical question is: for what? Membership felt the first priority should be for those expenses that are necessary for ongoing operations, such as insurance, California Democratic Council membership, communications, and some level of assistance to members who attend CDC meetings. These expenses both are needed to make the club a "going concern" and keep members involved on a state level. After that, membership felt the priorities should be the new Scholarship Fund, and other as-yet-undefined outreach projects to establish our place as active contributors to the community.

Scholarship Committee Update: The "Eleanor Roosevelt Service Award" will be given for the first time in May to a graduating student of Yosemite High School or one of its affiliated alternative schools. Scholarship Committee members will screen the candidates and select a winner based on criteria established by the membership. It's anticipated that the winner will be announced at the April or May meeting.

Upcoming Speaker: Cynthia Gonzalez, acting General Sales Manager for the **Infinity Radio** station that runs **Air America**, will speak to the club on March 4th. If you haven't discovered this station yet, you can hear it at KPFT 790 AM. Cynthia is excited about their expanding listener base and will tell us what they're hearing from listeners and about future plans.

Monika Moulin Earns Seat on New School Board

One evening in early fall, former VP of the Oakhurst Democratic Club Monika Moulin crowded onto the stage at the plush new performing arts center on the campus of Yosemite High School with no less than 10 other candidates for a not-yet-existing board of trustees for a not-yet-existing school board. The Candidates Forum, sponsored by the local teachers association, was designed to provide the public an opportunity to see and hear the 11 candidates make the case why they should be one of the members on the new board, should it come to pass.

When final votes were tallied on Election Night in November, candidate Moulin appeared to have snagged the fifth spot on the five member board, but the margin between the sixth-place vote-getter and Ms. Moulin was so narrow, only a couple of dozen votes or so, that neither the Madera County Elections Department nor the Madera County Office of Education were prepared to "call" it yet. Thus began a couple of weeks during which Moulin and supporters went into the proverbial nail-biting phase, as they waited for the final word on who were indeed the top 5 vote-getters in the 11-person race.

Getting to that period of "wait-and-see" was preceded by several weeks of grass-roots campaigning by candidate (now Board Member) Moulin. "I decided early on that the key was to do a few things well, instead of trying to employ lots and lots of tactics, some of which might be worth the effort, but others of which would most assuredly not deliver the necessary bang for the buck," said Moulin.

"Getting in the mailboxes of the registered voters was a primary goal of mine," she continued, "and with the support and assistance of friends and community members who backed my campaign, I was able to do two targeted pieces of mail in the weeks leading up to the election. Those mailers allowed me to say, clearly and in my own words, just why I thought I would be an asset to the new school board, and why I thought the board should come into being in the first place."

The new board, now known as the Yosemite Joint Unified School Board, serves the newly formed district which came into being at the pleasure of the voters. Just before the "who do you want on the school board" ballot question was a simple Yes/No question put before the electorate, asking if they thought the current Yosemite High School District and the Coarsegold District should unify and become one completely new school district being governed by a completely newly formed board of trustees. The question, which was Measure P on the ballot, passed decisively. So voters then moved down the ballot to mark preferences from the 11-candidate slate of hopeful prospective board members.

The new board has now begun meeting, and Board member Moulin is already en route to an intensive training session in Sacramento, put on by the California School Board Association, for new and first-time board members.

"It's going to be a lot of work, but I'm honored that the voters have given me this challenge," said Moulin.

Health Care for All - A Goal for California

Lynn Jacobsson, an Oakhurst Democratic Club member and Professor of Social Welfare Policy at Cal State -Fresno, recently shared her views on the state of the health care crisis here and in the nation. "Passing a single-payer health care bill in California is an issue waiting to happen. Health care in the U.S. is in a total 'meltdown' status with hospitals going out of business, patients going bankrupt, and large employers like General Motors and Delphi threatening bankruptcy because of health care obligations."

The good news for Californians is that **Senate Bill 840**, which would provide for universal health care has passed both the Senate and Assembly. However, the fiscal bill that needs to pass both houses is being introduced in January - February and everyone's support is needed to make sure that happens.

Health Care for All is the action group leading the charge for this bill. In 2005, it led the grassroots campaign that passed SB 840 in the Senate and Assembly Health committees, sponsored a study demonstrating the cost-effectiveness of a single-payer system, and garnered hundreds of co-authors and endorsements for the bill.

Benefits of SB 840

You will always be covered. No matter your situation, your health care needs will always be met. You have freedom of choice of providers. You choose from any licensed health care provider as your primary provider. Health Care for All (continued)

You will not be limited to certain providers. All providers remain private and independent.

You receive more comprehensive benefits. The proposed health insurance plan delivers full inpatient and outpatient services by health facilities, medical, dental, mental health and emergency care, prescription drugs, acupuncture, chiropractic care, vision care, substance abuse treatment, and eyeglasses, among many other benefits. Preventative care is emphasized.

You have affordable premiums. The vast majority of consumers should pay less out of pocket for their health care.

You participate in the decision-making. Consumers and all stakeholders participate in the decision-making in regional boards. An elected health commissioner will represent all users and providers.

Mariposa Democratic Club Sends 400 Boxes of

Supplies to Mississippi Hurricane Survivors

In response to the devastation caused by Hurricane Katrina, the Mariposa Democratic Club coordinated the donation of clothing and supplies to homeless families in Mississippi. "The people of Mariposa, as always, were beyond generous," said Jim Landis, club member and coordinator of the drive. "We were able to send 400 boxes of clothing, shoes, and bedding to Jackson Mississippi."

The Club worked with the Mississippi Association of Cooperatives, based in Jackson. The Association provides various services to rural farmers throughout the state. "Hundreds of families remain homeless and in Jackson area shelters," said Myra Bryant, Katrina Relief Coordinator for the Association. "There was no assistance in their home communities or Red Cross relief, so most of the families, who lost everything in the storm, came to Jackson." Indeed, the people of greater Mississippi have been forgotten in the media, which has focused mostly on New Orleans, and somewhat on just the gambling industry in Biloxi. "It was a perfect match," said Heather Bernikoff, club member and volunteer. "We knew Mississippi needed tremendous assistance. This was a case of rural people helping rural people - farmers helping farmers "

"When we started this project," Jim Landis explained, "we were led to believe that free shipping to the disaster area was available for the donated items. That turned out not Supplies for Hurricane Survivors (continued)

to be the case, and was a major set-back. We wanted to be responsive to the needs of the people in Mississippi, and ended up being delayed by several weeks. We pursued many avenues in a search for free shipping including shipping companies, airlines, private non-profit organizations, members of Congress, the California Air National Guard and the Office of Emergency Services--all to no avail. Once again, we turned to the people of Mariposa and Madera Counties, and they came through with the necessary funds."

There are so many people to thank: Thank you to Mike and Marianna Burrett, owners of Mariposa Self-Stor on Cole Road, who generously donated the space to store the collected items; the project would have been unmanageable without their assistance. Our thanks to Jave Brown and Jim Horner, also of Mariposa Self-Stor for their help in so many ways. Thank you to Heather Bernikoff and David Raboy for arranging a destination for the clothing and for negotiating the "best price" with the trucking company. Our thanks to all those who contributed so generously toward the shipping expense. Our thanks also to the dozens of Democratic Club members who spent several days sorting, packing, labeling the boxes, and loading the truck. And, of course, our sincere thanks to the scores of citizens and businesses of Mariposa and Madera Counties who gave and gave and gave so generously; we knew that they would, they always do.
