From the Wilds of Mariposa Discount Drug Plan for ALL County Residents By Les Marsden

Those unfortunate enough to be in e-mail communication with me on subjects of political impact know my e-mail identity for such matters is actlocally@sti.net. And while I do firmly believe that the most unifying and important positive political changes may be brought to bear from a strong NATIONAL progressive Democratic presence, there is much to be done right here--from home. Those attending the Mariposa Club Breakfast Meeting of May 13th received a great example of what can be done at the local level as Mariposa County District One Supervisor Lee Stetson presented a proposed Mariposa County Discount Drug Plan which would cover every county resident - at no cost whatsoever.

Its beauty lies in its utter simplicity: the great strength in numbers and the ability to negotiate prices with pharmaceutical companies. Everything a national discount drug plan (such as Bush's ludicrous Medicare Part D) should be but isn't. In the case of Part D, Medicare is specifically outlawed from negotiating prices from the drug companies, which in turn allows those companies to not only monopolize this critical commerce but to then charge anything they like.

Supervisor Lee Stetson (the only Democrat on the Board of Supervisors, incidentally) discovered this Prescription Discount Card plan, offered in a joint effort of participating county governments and the National Association of Counties (NACo). The plan offers free enrollment, family coverage, no limits, no age requirements, no income requirements and provides an average savings of 20% on the cost of prescription drugs. Savings can vary from about 11% to 34% depending on the drug and means by which purchased: drugs may be acquired from local participating pharmacies (and yes - there are local participant drugstores ready to go in Mariposa County) or through mail-order prescription fillings, by which the greatest discounted savings can be made.

Currently, only Plumas County has offered this plan in California but all it takes is the approval of the Board of Supervisors to be made a reality right here in Mariposa.

My hat is certainly off to our Supervisor Stetson, who will present this plan to the Mariposa Board of Supervisors for consideration and I urge every one of you to investigate the details. I encourage you to contact your supervisor and request they support enacting it in our County. After all: it costs nothing but will yield great progressive benefits. Let's demonstrate right here in the wilds of Mariposa what our federal government should be doing nationally. And if you don't live in Mariposa, please inform YOUR county supervisor about what is possible and the great benefits to be gained from this outstanding program. Remember: act locally!

Madera County Clerk Addresses Oakhurst Club

Madera County Clerk-Recorder Rebecca Martinez addressed the Oakhurst Democratic Club on April 1st about the new requirements of the "Help America Vote Act" and its implementation in time for the June 6th primary.

Ms. Martinez said that HAVA has both state and county mandates, one of which requires the state to create a voter database to match against Department of Motor Vehicle records. This process will help identify people who are registered in more than one county.

Another mandate requires that counties have at least one electronic voting device per voting location that allows a voter with a visual impairment to vote without assistance. The equipment must also accommodate any voter with a disability.

HAVA also requires that voting equipment provide for "second chance voting", such as alerting voters if they voted for more candidates in a race than allowed, or didn't vote in a particular race. She plans to conduct an extensive voter education program to remind voters to make sure that "if it says vote for one, only vote for one."

The county's current system is paper-based, and Ms. Martinez stated she believes in it whole-heartedly. "It serves our interests well and this community well". The greatest benefit of a papertrail system is that "if you ever doubt it tabulated correctly, you always have the luxury of hand-counting."

One of Ms. Martinez's primary responsibilities is to ensure accurate and secure voting and vote counting. "In my opinion, accuracy and ballot security are paramount."

She described the process for counting absentee ballots, and emphasized that the voter must be the one signing the ballot. Madera County Clerk Addresses Oakhurst Club (continued)

"Your signature is matched against your voter registration card", and only then will the ballot be counted. If staff is unable to match the signature, "I put together a panel, and sometimes, depending on how many I have, I will go through the expense of hiring a handwriting expert."

Ms. Martinez encourages anyone with questions to contact her office. "We welcome the scrutiny and recognize the importance of an open, transparent election process. It belongs to you."

The County Clerk-Recorder reminds voters that ballots must be in her office by 8:00PM of Election Day.
