



If you've attended our past Jefferson Dinners, and particularly last year's phenomenal (and totally sold-out) event, you'll really want to dedicate March 24th to this great evening of fun, conviviality, wonderful gourmet food, exciting speakers—and the warm goodwill provided by an oasis of Democrats in this red region. This year, we Democrats are finally BACK—and can only feel sorry for the poor Republicans who are now on the outside looking in at our great feast! For those not present at our January 13th Breakfast Meeting, Shirley Schmelzer brought to our attention the attempt now under way to resurrect Proposition 90 from its defeat in the 2006 midterm elections. Only today I received in the mail a petition from the "Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association" warning me of "constitutional amendments to undermine Prop 13, now pending in (the) state legislature..." and asking me to sign and return the petition immediately. PLEASE: if you receive such garbage as this, throw it away. Proposition 90 was a hugely deceptive scam—referred to by Robert Redford as "the single most

dangerous threat that has ever been leveled at our state's environment." Prop 90 was one in a long line of similar initiatives foisted upon the voters of many states by Howie Rich, a wealthy multimillionaire libertarian land developer from New York who is trying to remove the ability of local and state governments to regulate property and to protect the environment and community from development. In effect, if Prop 90 or its successor(s) were to become law, virtually ANY use for ANY property could be litigated, anyone could literally bankrupt local or state governments and all existing General Plans would be nullified. Prop 90 went down only by a 52—47 vote but its backers have returned and are attempting to collect YOUR signature in an effort to put its latest incarnation on California's 2008 ballot. PLEASE do NOT sign any such garbage and PLEASE educate your friends and family. Despite its cynical backers' claims, this is NOT about Proposition 13 or eminent domain; it's an assault on the environment and California's ability to protect itself from development. Don't fall for it!

Longtime Mariposa Democratic Club member Dick Kunstman passed away on January 9 at the age of 86. He and his wife of 64 years, Alice, had recently relocated from Mariposa to Ashland, Oregon, to be near their daughter. Dick had endured a number of health maladies in recent years and with characteristic self-possession, planned to control the date of his demise under Oregon's voter-approved Death with Dignity Act. Ironically, he died of natural causes mere days before the mandated waiting period was to conclude. Only a few months ago, and after moving to Oregon, the Kunstmans sent a check to the Mariposa Democratic Club: the check paid for two life memberships. We send our heartfelt sympathy and wishes to Alice and family as we honor the inspiration and driving spirit of Dick Kunstman.

Twenty-seven Democrats did just that on Sunday, January 14th. Those eligible to attend the meeting included all registered Democrats residing in Assembly District 25, which includes Oakhurst and Mariposa. They met to elect our representatives to the **Democratic State Central Committee (DSCC)**. Why is that important? Because the Democratic State Central Committee *governs* the California Democratic Party, so these are <u>very important positions</u>

Twelve positions were open to fill, and twelve were nominated and elected. But there was a little more to do: electing our **Executive Board** (**E-Board**) **Representative** to the California Democratic Party. The E-Board meets several times a year, votes on Party Resolutions, and handles endorsement of legislation. Pretty important job.

Both Tom Aja and Susan Rowe ran for the Executive Board, and in a close vote, Tom Aja was elected.

Poli-Sci Professor Addresses Oakhurst Club (Part 1)

In December, we had the pleasure of hosting David Schecter, Ph.D. in Political Science at CSU-Fresno. David made some ontarget prophecies when he talked to us after the 2004 election, so we're always interested in hearing what he has to say. One of those predictions was that every second term he could remember, the party in power had screwed things up, and (happily in this case), the past predicted the future once again. According to David, "the Bush administration has imploded and will be rated as one of the worst in modern political history."

David's speech was a good news/bad news summary, but given space constraints, we'll just address the good news for now. Stay tuned next issue for the bad news.

Good News:

- 1. One tremendous positive Democrats were competitive at fundraising which put us on par at the Congressional level.
- 2. California Democrats held onto the State Senate and Assembly, and we have 6 of 7 seats in the Executive office to counter Schwarzenegger. He cautioned, however, that this might not always be the case after redistricting takes place in 2011.
- 3. Nancy Pelosi The only thing history books will remember in 50 years is this is the year Americans felt comfortable electing a woman as Speaker of the House. Currently, only 14% 15% of House and Senate seats are women. Congress looks nothing like America and is still a "white male middle-aged, millionaire boy's club".
- 4. Democrats appealed to independent voters for the first time in about 5 election cycles, but the size of registered Democrats and

Republicans is shrinking. "Even though Democratic activists are interested in keeping the Democratic Party whole, I will ask you to be as nice to independents as you can over the next 2 years. Democrats will need them. It's OK to work with them".
