What's Happening with Our Healthcare?

A National and State Update by Lynn Jacobsson

If 18,000 Americans were dying at the hands of terrorists in this country, wouldn't most of us expect the government to do something about it? According to the Institute of Medicine 18,314 adults in the United States die annually due to a lack of health care insurance, and yet the Bush Administration has done nothing to address this on-going crisis. In fact, the Republicans are moving in the other direction. In the recent battle over children's health care coverage, Bush is trying to cut back on coverage for children by threatening to veto the recent bi-partisan congressional health care deal on the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP). The SCHIP compromise forged by Congress would continue to provide health insurance to 6.6 million children (800,000 in Calif.) and expand coverage to an additional 3.2 million of the 8 million children without insurance nationwide. Unfortunately, the measure did not pass with a veto-proof majority in both the House and Senate. Bush denounced the legislation as a step "down the path to government-run health care for every American."

At the state level as well, the Republican leadership in the Assembly and the state Senate continues to fight any real reform that would provide affordable health care to the 6.5 million uninsured Californians. They have made it clear that not only will they refuse to vote for any Democratic-sponsored bills on health care such as Assembly Bill 8 (a "pay or play," employer-mandate to provide health coverage), or Senate Bill 840, the single-payer health plan, but they also will not support even the very problematic legislative proposal from the governor for a private universal health insurance program which includes an "individual mandate" for each Californian to purchase care on the health insurance market. Individual mandates, whether proposed by Schwarzenegger (or Hillary Clinton, for that matter), amount to vastly increased profits for the private health care insurance industry at the expense of the public, and do not begin to address the lack of affordability of health insurance in the private market.

The Public is Ahead of the Legislators

In the meantime, as public support for a "single payer" system continues to grow—from only 24% last year to 36% in August, 2007—support for the governor's so-called "shared responsibility" approach which relies on the private health insurance system has fallen from 52% last December, 2007, to just 33% this August. In the 2006 legislative session, both the California Assembly and the Senate passed SB840, a comprehensive single-payer plan, only to have it vetoed by Schwarzenegger. This year, state Senator Sheila Kuehl (D.) withdrew SB840 (in the face of another veto by the governor) after it had passed the Assembly, in order to keep the bill alive and ready to reintroduce in 2008. In spite of the "behind-closed-door" wrangling by Democrats Nunez and Perata to try to come up with a compromise with the Republican governor, the bottom line is that the Republicans are going to continue to block any meaningful health care reform in the State of California.

At both the national and state level, if we really want universal health care, we must continue to pressure the Democratic candidates for President and state offices to go beyond the insufficient incremental reforms that they have proposed thus far, and provide us with the kind of health care system that is enjoyed by every industrialized country but our own. At this point, Dennis Kucinich is the only Democratic Presidential candidate to have endorsed single-payer health care for all Americans. At the same time, we must challenge the myths that the insurance industry is promoting—that single-payer means a government-run system, that our taxes will rise, that the quality of care will suffer, etc. We need to continue to educate and build support among the public for the only real reform that will save us tax dollars and provide comprehensive, affordable health care for all.

Changing Politics As Usual in Community Development By Ellie Schermerhorn

On August 4th, the Oakhurst Democratic Club heard from **Derek** Winning, Deputy Director of the Madera County Transportation Commission (MCTC), the County's independent regional planning agency. Derek talked about the work the MCTC is doing to get public input on how Madera County should develop given projections of massive population growth from approximately 150,000 residents today to 410,000 by the year 2050.

MCTC is working with other counties to define what's called the **San Joaquin Valley Blueprint**. A series of public meetings is held and surveys taken to determine the "vision and values" of county residents, and to use these as a basis for constructing a plan for county growth. When local governments propose new development, they'll need to show how it fits into the "blueprint" that's been defined by the community.

Members at the meeting were skeptical that local residents could have any influence given the County's history of approving developments without adequate consideration of transportation, water, environmental, and other factors. Local area plans that took years of public input, like the Coarsegold Area Plan, are ignored or dismantled, and the Madera County Board of Supervisors is seen as bending to the influence of developers, regardless of the impact their plans may have on current residents.

Derek acknowledged there are strong pressures at work when it comes to land use decisions, but said the thrust of his agency's work is to "potentially change the ways things work" by getting community involvement and mapping out a plan for the future that "will be different than the way we've been doing things." His agency will be asking the politicians to adopt plans based on what the community supports and the agency discerns through workshops and surveys, some of which have already taken place in

Oakhurst and other areas of Madera County.

Derek pointed out that the MCTC holds "the funding strings on transportation. We administer all of the transportation funds in the County", and this funding is tied to how well projects address the community's expressed desires on development. So if Madera County wants the MCTC to fund building a new intersection, or bike lanes, or expanded roadways, "don't come to me unless you can show me that your community has signed off on (these plans) and (the local governments) have become compliant by introducing ordinances that produce those growth results."

So think of the MCTC as an agency helping to carry our voice with the County Board of Supervisors, and participate in the workshops the MCTC will hold this fall.

In the process of doing voter registration with Ruth Stairs (a member of the Democratic Club of Coarsegold) at the Coarsegold Market on September 23, I realized how important the issue of health care policy is to most of the people who stopped to chat.

Although most of them were registered to vote, the majority of them spoke about problems with their health insurance, the high cost of prescription drugs, or their lack of health care coverage due to a pre-existing condition.

As we sat at our registration table with the information on universal single-payer health care petitions all around us, a car wash was taking place in the parking lot—the family of a local boy, who is a cancer patient at Valley Children's Hospital, was trying to raise funds to help pay for the medical tests that the boy needs that are not covered by their health insurance.

As I sat there in the parking lot of the Coarsegold Market I pondered the irony and anguish of living in a country in which the current Administration claims we can afford to spend \$720 million per day on the occupation of Iraq, but at the same time we are unable to afford to provide health care for the 420,000 children that that amount of money would buy here in America.
