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#### Still Can't Decide Which Democratic Candidate To Vote For on Feb. 5<sup>th</sup>? By Lynn Jacobsson

One thing all of us Democrats agree on is that any one of the eight Democratic candidates for President is going to do a much better job than any one of the Republican candidates! Since the California primary is rapidly approaching on February 5<sup>th</sup>, we have to make up our minds soon. A recent article in *The Nation* magazine asked eight commentators to make a case for each of the Democratic candidates. We are reprinting the highlights of each of their comments focusing on the war and occupation of Iraq.

## Joseph Biden by John Nichols

"The best fighter, the most quick-witted." On Iraq: Although Biden tried to require diplomatic efforts before military options could be considered, he ultimately voted to authorize George W. Bush's attack on Iraq.

#### Hillary Clinton by Ellen Chesler

"A progressive who can win—and govern." Clinton voted to authorize the invasion of Iraq but now favors "a responsible withdrawal of our troops" without being willing to set a timetable for leaving Iraq. She has stated that nothing is off the table with regard to Iran.

## Christopher Dodd by Bruce Shapiro

"Strongest on human rights and civil liberties." Voted for the Iraq War, but has been fighting to redeem himself and undo the damage of the "war on terror."

# John Edwards by Katherine S. Newman

"Like FDR, he's the real deal." On Iraq: Edwards also voted for the invasion of Iraq, but has since expressed regret for that

position. He joins Clinton and Obama in refusing to pledge an end to the occupation of Iraq, even by 2013.

## Mike Gravel by Richard Kim

"An inconvenient truth-teller." Indefatigable opponent of both the Vietnam War and the Iraq war. He supports immediate withdrawal from Iraq and reparations for the Iraqi people.

## Dennis Kucinich by Gore Vidal

"A farsighted populist and pacifist." Opposes any more funding for the illegal wars in Iraq and Afghanistan and favors an immediate withdrawal of troops, private contractors, and a closure of all bases in both countries.

## Barack Obama by Michael Eric Dyson

"A visionary candidate for a new America." Stands against the war in Iraq as a "futile gesture of American empire that would do little to beat back the threat of terror." Not willing to set an immediate timetable to end the occupation, however.

## Bill Richardson by Rocky Anderson

"The broadest experience, smart on Iraq." Pledges a swift end to the occupation of Iraq, pulling out all troops and bases. Opposes "war on terror" tactics such as kidnapping, disappearing and torture of people around the world.

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#### **Boxer Staff Addresses Oakhurst Democratic Club**

Ameen Khan, Director for Central and Eastern California, spoke at the club's November 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting. Ameen is responsible for a far-flung range of counties that includes our mountain area.

Most of Ameen's time was spent fielding questions from the audience, a number of which revolved around Boxer's campaign strategy. Ameen was careful to note that, as a taxpayer-funded staff person, he was not allowed to participate in political campaign strategy or activities. His role at the meeting was to hear constituents' concerns and, to the extent he was able, inform the audience about Senator Boxer's positions and legislative efforts on behalf of both Democratic and Republican Californians.

A general theme that ran throughout the audience questions involved frustration with the lack of concrete accomplishments given the new, albeit small, Democratic majority. Several members also felt unprepared to respond to a question often posed by their Republican friends: What have the Democrats accomplished now that they have a majority?

Ameen pointed out that legislation was being passed out of the Environmental and Public Works Committee that never would have seen the light of day prior to Barbara Boxer becoming Chair. He gave brief remarks on some of the Committee's work, and suggested people go to Boxer's web site at <u>boxersenate.gov</u> to learn more about her efforts.

A review of her web site reveals that her Committee was about to hold hearings on a bi-partisan bill she co-sponsored to combat global warming, calling to reduce emissions to 1990 levels by 2020 and to reduce emissions by 80% from 1990 levels by 2050. It was also working on final passage of the conference report on H.R. 1495, the Water Resources Development Act of 2007. The

bill, which passed the Senate by an overwhelming bipartisan margin of 81 to 12 and withstood a presidential veto, authorizes flood control, navigation, and ecosystem restoration through nearly \$7 billion for wetlands restoration and flood control projects nationwide.

Ameen emphasized that Senator Boxer and her staff closely monitor phone calls, e-mail and letters received from constituents and encourages them. He recommended that letters be sent to her Fresno office rather than Washington, D.C. to speed their review.

## California Democratic Council and State Party Executive Board Meetings

The CDC meeting that took place on Nov. 17 in Anaheim was both interesting and informative. Henry Vandermeir, CDC President, unveiled a long list of support services being offered to clubs through affiliation with CDC.

Guest speaker Jess Durfee, San Diego County Chair discussed the advantages and opportunities provided by forming a regional Council of Clubs, central committees, and other interested parties in a given area. Joint efforts in campaigning, fundraising, networking and visibility have been very successful for their Council of Clubs.

> Note: There is an effort underway to form such an organization for our area. It is hoped that each interested Democratic organization will send a delegate to serve as their representative. The goal of the organization is to provide ongoing communication among area organizations, provide support for events and develop a strategy for successful voter registration, club development and growth, and campaign coordination throughout our region. Every effort will be made to utilize our time and money wisely, combine meetings and provide useful information to be reported back to the individual clubs and central committees through their representative. The organizational meeting will take place sometime in February following the primary election. Details will follow as they become available.

The training manuals have been distributed to all of the affiliated organizations in our area. They are wonderful tools and I hope they will be well used. My recommendation is that every subcommittee of every club be given a copy of that portion that pertains to their area of concern, keeping the original manual CDC and CDP Executive Board Meetings (Continued)

intact. Updates will be provided as new material is developed.

CDC now distributes an electronic newsletter every other month and will welcome articles of general interest.

The California Democratic Party met on Nov. 16, 17 and 18. Many caucus meetings took place and many issues were discussed and acted upon. Plans are well underway for the annual convention to be held in San Jose on March 28-30.


