As Les reminded us in the last newsletter, we can't afford to be lulled into thinking that the widespread disgust the nation feels about the current Administration will swing the election in our favor. There's significant work ahead of us, and the Club's Board looks forward to your participation.

Primary elections have begun and Democrats have come out in record numbers to vote. Let's do our part to help California Democrats vote in record numbers as well. If you need a ride to the polls or can give a ride, please call the club phone number.

Historically, the California voter turnout is low, about 30 % for midterm elections and up to 40% for presidential elections. That's nearly 60% of Californians who do not vote!

Perhaps one of the reasons that Californians don't vote is that California, like most states, gives its entire block of Electoral College votes to one candidate. All of California's votes are expected to go to the Democratic candidate, so why vote? A 2007 Harvard University study found almost three-quarters of Americans favor a direct national popular vote over the current system. As was mentioned at our last Oakhurst Democratic Club meeting, changing the Electoral College system via a Constitutional Amendment is a difficult process. But, as it turns out, there is another way. A number of states could change the process by passing a state law.

This law is an interstate compact called the "Agreement Among the States to Elect the President by National Popular Vote." Under this compact, all of the electoral votes of a member state would be awarded to the presidential candidate who receives the most popular votes in all 50 states (and DC). The compact would take effect only when enacted, in identical form, by states possessing a majority of the electoral votes. Thus, when the compact takes effect, it would guarantee the White House to the candidate with the most votes. In California this bill passed in 2007 in the Assembly and Senate but was not signed by our Governor. See www.nationalpopularvote.com for more details. Oakhurst Democratic Club (Continued)

Every citizen's vote "counts" and is important. No more battleground states.

This would end the situation in which the winner of the Electoral College votes takes the office of President, regardless of who wins the popular vote.

In States where the polls show that the vote is close, possible tampering with the ballots would not have the huge effect on the election that it could under the current system.

Also, since this bill has bipartisan support it may be good for discussion with Republican friends!

So, let's first vote Feb 5th for our Democratic Party Candidate, and work to get him or her elected. Then let's fix the Electoral College System bringing America closer to the democracy we all want.

Republicans and Electoral College Vote "Reform"

After listening to Matthew Jude Egan, Ph.D, J.D. describe "The Republican Attempt to Divide California's Electoral Votes" at the December Oakhurst Democratic Club meeting, I was impressed. You've gotta hand it to those wily Republicans. They're skillful at creating ways to tilt elections in their favor, and have the money to implement their craftiest ideas.

Witness the "Presidential Election Reform Act" filed by Arnold Schwarzenegger's personal attorney for election issues, Sacramento lawyer **Thomas Hiltachk** of *Bell, McAndrews & Hiltachk, LLP* which bills itself as "specializing in campaign, election and administrative law and litigation". Hiltachk also represented John Kerry's nemesis, the "Swift Boaters", on legal issues the group had in California.

Super-rich Congressional Representative Daryl Issa, a lead financier in Gray Davis' recall, stepped in with his checkbook to fund the initiative and top-notch signature gathering experts were hired to get the required number (Note: Each signature is worth \$3.75 to the worker who convinces a voter to sign).

Brilliant execution and an ingenious plan: Pass an initiative that would change California from an electoral vote "winner take all" state to one which allocates electoral votes based on the popular vote in each Congressional district. Looking back at the 2004 election, this would have given 22 more votes to President Bush, or about the number of electoral votes allocated to the state of Ohio.

So pass initiative and - BINGO- Republican Presidential candidate wins!

We're likely to see this initiative on either the June or November ballot. If it's on the June ballot, *turnout will likely be low, and that*

favors Republicans. If it's on the November ballot and passes, it could be implemented when the Electoral College votes are tallied in December.

Arguments Against the Initiative

Keep these arguments in mind when talking to your friends and neighbors:

1. If Republicans are so interested in equal representation, why aren't they pursuing this in other states? Why just in California?

2. <u>Article 2</u> of the Constitution says *state legislators have the right to decide how electoral votes are allocated*. This was part of the Supreme Court's argument in <u>Bush v Gore</u>, so the initiative may be unconstitutional.

3. Allocating electoral votes by congressional district doesn't achieve greater fairness in results since *Congress draws the districts and they are gerrymandered* across the country to assure each Congressperson's reelection.

Endorsement Vote Shows Surprising Results

Despite the short notice and heavy workload during this election cycle, over 150 delegates from across California participated in the California Democratic Council's first ever online endorsement vote. Delegates from both the Oakhurst and Mariposa Democratic Clubs participated.

Although no candidate received the official 60% needed for an endorsement, the mix of grassroots participants shows a different story than most polls have typically indicated.

With 59 votes, Hillary Clinton barely squeaked past John Edwards' 55 votes. Surprisingly, Barack Obama came in at a distant third with only 26 votes followed by Dennis Kucinich with 13.

While we obviously cannot draw any definite conclusions from this small sample of voters, it does seem to indicate that among California party regulars, there is a different type of battle going on when independents and not so 'active' voters aren't added to the mix.
