

The Only Numbers That Count

Current polls show McCain would defeat Clinton in the general election? And Obama loses to him too? Polls, polls....for every poll showing McCain beating Clinton or Obama, I'll bet I can find one showing my grandmother beating McCain. And there's probably one favoring Granny over Obama or Clinton, too. Candidate polls are just snapshots in time, and with eight months to go, nearly anything can – and probably will – happen. The election won't really begin until both sides have officially anointed their candidates.

Here's the real, sobering news for Republicans, however: partisan affiliation trend data released March 2, 2008 (by Rasmussen) shows the number of Democrats has ballooned. The percentage of Americans declaring themselves Democrats is now 41.5 while the percentage of Republicans has shrunk to 31.8. The Democrats' 41.5% is the highest-ever recorded number, and no mere snapshot in time but a steady trend over the past few years. February 2008 alone showed surprising growth: the Democrats' advantage grew by (ready?) 4.6%. For the past few decades registration has been (roughly) one-third Republican, one-third Democratic and onethird miscellaneous, but today's Democratic 10-point edge is (according to Rasmussen) "the highest (advantage) level ever measured." The remaining 26.7% of the voting population is divided between several smaller parties and those who decline to state any affiliation. Even worse news for McCain? Those independents are voting Democratic.

We've seen astonishing primary figures over the past months in those states which allow open voting by independents; the independent vote has been going overwhelmingly to Democratic candidates. In some cases, and even in very red states, the figures have shown as much as 75% of independents voting for Democrats. And probably the most serious news of all: the youth vote is now solidly Democratic – with a 13-point advantage to the

Democrats in the under 30-year-old demographic. And even greater 17-point Democratic advantages among women voters and 18 points for retirees. That's big news.

So the question of America being ready to elect a woman or an African-American president is moot: the greatest affiliation gains have been made by the Democratic Party after it became clear the party will be offering either a woman or an African-American candidate, both supremely qualified. Is America ready? Absolutely. Is all America ready? Absolutely not. Some still reject human differences outright and refuse to vote for anyone not of their own comfortable skin hue, gender, or religion. refuse to consider ability and skill over human physiology.

But fortunately, far more Americans are objective enough to put America first, to support and elect the most capable leader regardless of skin color or gender. To put a positive, populist agenda and true American morality – the sort our Founders had in mind – above any sort of myopic exclusionary tradition. And that's corroborated by the record numbers of primary voters whether self-identified as Democrats or Independents - who've opted for a leader first, a progressive platform first, real change first – and have little cared whether that leader is a woman or an African-American. After 220 years of white male presidents, it's about time color and gender became totally irrelevant.



Brian Austin in Race for Madera Superior Court Seat By Ellie Schermerhorn

Attorney and former law enforcement officer Brian Austin is challenging Madera County District Attorney Ernest LiCalsi in the June 3rd election, competing for a six-year term as a judge on the Madera County Superior Court. Brian contacted the Oakhurst Democratic Club and asked to attend our April meeting and introduce himself to our members. While the club is not currently endorsing anyone in the race, I offered Brian the opportunity to tell us about his experience both at the meeting and in this newsletter.

A Madera County native, Brian has practiced law for over 12 years in the county area. He spent 6 years in the Marine Corps, and served more than 6 years as a Police Officer and Deputy Sheriff. This experience inspired him to go to law school and he was graduated from the San Joaquin College of Law in Fresno. Brian's spent time in the mountains, teaching political science at the college here in Oakhurst for 6 years.

Brian's trial experience includes civil and criminal, family, probate, and contract law, and he served as a Judge Pro Tem for over 2 years, which he considers excellent experience for the Superior Court position. He also has legal experience with the Unemployment Appeals Board, Workers Compensation Board, and Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Brian believes Madera County is at "the crossroads of growth and the politics here is changing." He feels LiCalsi "is a longtime politician, and Madera County needs fresh ideas and someone without preconceived loyalties. Being a Judge, requires honesty, integrity and complete fairness. I am that candidate."

MOC Monitors County Development

Ahwahnee resident and Madera Oversight Coalition member Tony Ward described MOC's mission to Oakhurst Democrats on March 1st. Tony, a former member of the county planning commission for 8 years, is also active in many other historical and regional conservation organizations.

Tony was clear that **MOC** is an apolitical organization and there is no political litmus test for joining. It is organized as a non-profit, and will not participate in political campaigns or ballot measures. Everyone who is a resident of Madera County is eligible to join, and MOC is actively seeking members.

MOC grew out of concerns that land use decisions in Madera County were being made without adherence to the county general plan and state law which define how the county is to manage property within its boundaries. MOC's primary objectives are to "encourage responsible growth through adherence to California land use law" and to "promote the health, safety and welfare of the public within Madera County". Its main focus is development along the Hwy 41 corridor and related impact on Ahwahnee, Bass Lake, Coarsegold, North Fork, and Oakhurst.

One unfortunate but true fact is that the county pays attention to complaints if there's a realistic possibility that they can lead to lawsuits, so MOC has retained a highly respected lawyer, Patience Milrod, to represent it. One specific action she is addressing now is the "Gateway Village" development which was approved by the county based on an environmental impact report that does not address the "cumulative impact" when added to other massive developments the county has approved in the area.

MOC also provides education, information and support to citizens concerned about development taking place in their neighborhoods. A recent example is the 64 condominiums planned for Bass Lake.

Area residents believed an environmental impact report was required to determine how the development would affect problems which currently exist with inadequate sewage facilities, water availability and access/egress in case of fire. With MOC's help and expertise, the residents were able to prevail and convince the planning commission that an EIR needed to be done.

MOC is also challenging how money is used. Funds approved through Proposition A for Rd 415 were taken away for a bridge for Ave 17 down in valley. MOC has taken it to the Madera County grand jury.

Tony closed by saying MOC needs our support financially and morally, and our presence at meetings when MOC brings issues to the Madera County Board of Supervisors. It "makes a difference when you have a body of people present".
