25th Assembly District Delegates Elected to the State Party By Peter Leinau

For Democrats throughout California, the weekend of January 11th and 12th was the opportunity to elect Delegates from their Assembly District to be their voice and representatives to the California Democratic Party convention in April. The twelve delegates for Assembly District 25 represent our Mountain Democrat communities and beyond to represent Calaveras, Mono, Tuolumne, and half of Stanislaus Counties.

Semi-official results for the AD 25 (pending final processing by the state Democratic Party) are: Thomas Aja, Gail Bunge, Christopher Chaffee, Sally Chenault, Patrick Ip, Nancy Mooney, Bill Robbins, Sharon Robbins, Susan Sanders, Helena Straughter, Alan Strauss, and myself—Peter Leinau. The group represents a mix of returning delegates and new faces, men and woman, and senior party members and youth. Perhaps reflecting the Modesto voting location, geographically 10 of the 12 Delegates elected are from the north half of the District, with over half of these from the general Modesto area. I will be proposing that future AD25 voting be in multiple voting sites to make it easier for our widespread rural populations to participate in the internal party processes.

My own interest in running to represent our district to the State Party stems from my recent write-in campaign for the 19th congressional seat and my realization of how much local organizing and issues-education work was still needed to mobilize a progressive majority. I believe our success in the future will be dependant on effective organizing and education efforts now, and we will need the Democratic Party leadership to support our local efforts in a sustained a meaningful fashion. Now as one of our AD25 Delegates, I am committed to working toward that goal, and contributing to our success through the next elections in 2010! I am honored to have the opportunity to represent the District and our Mountain Area Democrats to the State Party, and I look forward to hearing your thoughts on organizing toward our future. It was just a few months ago that gasoline prices were pushing \$5 a gallon in California, and food prices and commodity prices were soaring. OPEC and oil companies were awash in record profits, and the rest of us felt sucker punched. How could it be that a trip to the pump now cost twice as much as it had before?

But, obeying the laws of economics, we reexamined our driving habits, and made some rational changes. Was that trip to Fresno really necessary? And would the quality of our lives be significantly affected if we drove the not-quite-as-comfortable-but-more-fuel-efficient vehicle there instead?

How do we maintain our consumer power in the face of supply manipulation, and an inevitable decline in this finite resource?


