When our new First Lady, Michelle Obama, made her initial and only university commencement address this spring at the University of California at Merced on the 15th of May, five of six San Joaquin Valley congressmen skipped the event.

All had been invited, but only Pleasanton Democrat Jerry McNerney, whose East Bay-centered 11th District includes a portion of the northern San Joaquin Valley, had the grace and good manners to attend.

According to a spokesperson, our own George Radanovich from the 19th District didn't "make any special effort to avoid it," easing concerns among constituents that George ever be subjected to any form of heavy lifting.

Bakersfield Republican Kevin McCarthy said he had an art competition to attend, paintings evidently taking precedence over professional protocol.

The Young Democrats, for example, threw a block party for Gavin Newsom. They really did close an entire block and Wyclef Jean provided an amazing concert.

Everyone agreed, however, that the major issue essential for all of us to change is the 2/3rds rule required to pass the State budget.
