Dear Auntie Sam,

Everyone gets in a lather when it comes to Social Security. My understanding is it's not in nearly the dire straits that Medicare is, but it can be carefully tuned now so that it will still be there when our grandchildren retire. If phased in gradually, I see no problem with extending the retirement age, taxing those who work past the retirement age, or reducing the amount a person collects due to an already higher income. These all seem like sensible ways to control the system. Thanks for your thoughts on this, Auntie Sam!

Puzzled Politico

Dear Puzzled,

I have to admit, Auntie Sam's head swims a bit when the budget crisis gets discussed. There are so many different viewpoints, and they all seem to have some validity.

With a maximum benefit of maybe \$2,500 a month, no one with just Social Security will be living the luxury life; this is definitely a safety net, not a retirement bonanza. So let Auntie Sam state firmly right up front that cutting benefits is not the way to adjust Social Security. There is no fat in that payment.

Back to the question: can small changes help Social Security remain solvent? Let's note the latest calculations show the system will be solvent through 2037; at that point, it will be able to pay

out only 75% of its benefits. (Other studies give it 'till 2047.) It is solvent for that long because, quite frankly, most of the changes you mention have already been done. For example, the full retirement age was raised from 65 to a maximum of 67 for people born after 1959. Raising it higher makes Auntie Sam nervous; there are a lot of people in occupations who are plain worn out by the time they get to the mid-sixties. She does like the incentives offered to people who delay taking their Social Security; the current maximum age to start taking benefits is 70. She could see raising that age for those who want to keep working.

In terms of taxing people who work after retirement age: Social Security benefits are taxed if you (and your spouse) make enough money – over \$25,000 for individuals; over \$32,000 for a joint return. You may be taxed on up to 85% of the benefits if you make enough money.

Auntie Sam hesitates to reduce the benefits paid to people based on their income; that goes down the slippery slope of means testing. Anyone who paid in should be able to collect. However, Auntie Sam is all for raising the tax rate on those people who have a lot of money, so we get more of that back. And perhaps the highest earners should be taxed on more than 85% of the benefits; that seems reasonable.

One thing you didn't mention, dear Puzzled, is increasing the income limit on which to collect Social Security; currently the limit is \$106,800. Auntie Sam sees benefits to raising that.

I think you are correct, that doing a few more small adjustments now (raise the \$106,800 limit; let people postpone collecting until after age 70; increase the amount taxed for people of wealth; and restore the payroll tax back to where it was before the holiday) will keep the system going just fine. Now, if only the other deficit issues were as easy to address!

2nd Vice President: Run meetings if President and First VP not available; organize speakers for meetings along with First VP.


Recording Secretary: Take and distribute minutes of all meetings, whether general or executive committee meetings. Maintain archive of minutes.
