IT'S YOUR VOTE—USE IT OR LOSE IT!

It's more important than ever that you vote in the June primary.

California now has a Top Two Candidates Open Primary

You may have been thinking that voting in the primary wasn't necessary as you could simply vote for the Democrat, or whomever you considered to be the best candidate in November. But, what if no Democrats or even an independent candidate are included in the November ballot for our new districts? That is now a real possibility.

With the new Top Two Primary system, the top two vote getters in the primary election will be the only two candidates on the ballot in November regardless of party affiliation, if any. This is a major change in the way we choose elected officials. If Democrats and independents don't get out and vote in the June Primary, the two candidates on the ballot in November for our new Mountain-centric districts could easily be two Republicans or from the Tea Party. Selection of candidates on the November ballot is no longer in the hands of the major parties, but in the hands of the people—in this case, the people who vote in the primary elections.

All districts for elective state and federal offices have been redrawn. The mountain and foothill communities now have voting districts that represent us, and do not, in general, contain urban population centers in the Central Valley. While our new rural mountain/foothill districts favor Republicans, elected officials will have to represent our needs, and not those of the Central Valley.

Fortunately we have two very good Democratic Candidates: Marc Boyd for the 5th Assembly district (State) and Jack Uppal for the 4th Congressional district (U.S. Congress). Please vote in the June primary and support these candidates or we may not have a choice we like in November.

A Momentary Diversion from Politics

On May 11, 2012 Mariposa was the victim of fire—as this historic gold rush town so often has been over the decades. But this one was personal: fire broke out that evening in the Pizza Factory, and immediately, the entire historic 5th Street block was doomed. Within a few hours, all the conjoined structures (some dating to 1858) were black rubble. Less than 24 hours after it began, the smoldering debris was trucked away. While the cause hasn't been officially declared, longtime property concerns were the reason the Board of Directors of the Mariposa County Arts Council, Inc. was relocating our business at the end of our current lease. Unfortunately, that move was to have occurred late in 2012. Fortunately, the move will now be far easier due to the fact that all our fixed assets (as well as a treasured collection of consigned oneof-a-kind art) no longer exist. Our databases, equipment, furniture, institutional records, our 31 years of documented history, computers, fixtures, all the long-accumulated tools necessary to run our 501(c)3 business: all burned to a crisp. Gone forever.

Sure, I could damn the conservative mindset that rails against governmental safety building standards. This entire block-long building lacked retrofitted sprinklers. Ancient wooden sub-flooring was oil-soaked from time spent as an auto garage and its common block-long attic space without firewalls was a mocking finger-poke in the eye of the fire-fates. Concerns had been repeatedly raised about the neighboring employee smokers who defiantly tossed their butts willy-nilly, and only occasionally into an old coffee can provided for the assumed purpose against old exterior wooden siding. Ancient electrical wiring frequently called attention to itself in disconcerting ways. I love history; I love old architecture. And unfortunately, old buildings do need laws and regulation to protect them from careless or nonchalant owners: the types of owners who demand that gub'mint stay outta their lives and bidness. What those buildings silently witnessed for a century-and-a-half boggles the mind, from the presence of John C. Fremont and Presidents Grant

and Garfield to John Muir. Generations of Mariposans who were born and died. Literally innumerable tens of millions of visitors passed by on their way through town. And in a gasp of brief time, 154 years of observation ended and history itself died.

But the sudden, shocking loss of our Mariposa County Arts Council also gave jaded me unexpected gratitude as I saw the power of art to unite people in the absolutely beautiful aftermath of that fire. Innumerable calls of concern came from all over. Immediate responses from those offering help. Immeasurable depth of care. I had no idea so many people knew we existed, much less CARED about that fact.

Materials were immediately donated from individual artists, supplies were donated by the Merced Arts Council—a donation that was the impetus for me to make my first visit (after 11 years back home in California, in Mariposa) to the Merced Arts Council's office, to finally meet staff there. I'm not going to descend to cliché by leaping upon the old silver-lining saw, but this experience has been a remarkable demonstration of the power of art. The power of art to heal, the power of art to bring people together, the power of art to share our common humanity, the power of art to communicate, the power of art to express the inexpressible. And by the time you read this, the Mariposa County Arts Council will have begun its long bounce back by opening the initial portion of our new office at 5009 Highway 140—atop Chocolate Soup. Fires may come and go, buildings might lose their battle against neglect and the elements, but the arts live on forever. And there's something tremendously inspiring about that.

Remembering Remembering

"I'm not familiar, precisely, with exactly what I said, but I stand by what I said, whatever it was."—Willard "Mitt" Romney—May 17, 2012.

What Republican Presidential Candidate Romney couldn't remember were words spoken only weeks earlier when Mitt proclaimed that President Obama wants to make America "a less Christian nation."

But total recall is not one of Governor Romney's strongest suits. When recently confronted with uncontested allegations by five former school mates from Cranbrook, an elite Michigan prep school, that he had personally led a vicious bullying attack on another classmate found guilty of "being different", Romney blurted, "I don't remember". Back then, "queer" meant a bit as "gay" does now, but in a much meaner, more slashing fashion.

But Mitt's not alone with his memory challenges. In 2004, American Author/Historian Gore Vidal (quintessentially "queer" and mighty proud of it) wrote his brilliant "Imperial America: The United States of Amnesia", the primary point being that, as a people, we tend to forget what we should most remember. Oops. Not good.

We recently observed Memorial Day 2012, a "remembering" day set aside to honor our fallen heroes, tribute perhaps best extended by seriously reflecting upon our own responsibilities in the waging of American wars.

Public opinion against continuing military efforts in Afghanistan now equals opposition to the Vietnam conflict at its highest point in the early '70's. But the same mind set which brought us Vietnam, Iraq, and a full decade in Afghanistan now regards Iran as another golden opportunity—a mind set which blames our entire current Federal deficit on a President who inherited an unmitigated disaster in progress when he assumed office in January of '09—a mind set now stunningly unmindful of "George the Conqueror."

George W. Bush will be, according to all Republican sources, not remotely involved in this year's campaign, nor will he be asked to contribute anything more meaningful at this year's Republican Convention in Tampa Bay than his complete absence.

Try to find Tea Party friends who remain staunch supporters of "W's" policies or openly remember if they ever were. Ask how they currently feel about heading into Iraq in the first place—guided by what is now universally recognized as demonstrably altered information as we witness 4,408 American dead, 33,184 American injured, two trillion American dollars squandered and 100,000 Iraqis killed since the initiation of "Shock and Awe" in March of 2003. Mariposa Democratic Club June Meeting:


