A Christmas Wish

Good for us! As a consequence of the November elections, our California Democratic Party now enjoys supermajority status in State government and can take great satisfaction in the approval of Proposition 30 to the delight of Governor Brown and defeat of Proposition 32 to the horror of corporate union haters.

Nationally, President Obama has decisively won a second term in office, we have increased the Democratic majority in the U.S. Senate to 51, bringing our strength to 53 counting two additional "Independents"—and have begun to narrow heavy Republican domination of the House with the new tally now 242 "them" vs. 193 "us."

And where are we now? Pretty much where we were before, but with a bit of welcome traction.

One thing has not changed—a mindless, poisonous, unwarranted hatred of Barack Obama by a Conservative core continually fed by FOX News, Talk Radio and the Christian right. The name "Obama" has become emotionally synonymous with such classically condemned figures as Satan, MaoTse Tung and even, according to local righter, J. R. "Junior" Froelich, Adolf Hitler.

Froelich even closed a recent Sierra Star column with the words of "You should be afraid. Be very afraid" in a final burst of pure, purple prose paranoia bemoaning the President's 332 to 206 Electoral victory.

We should have a lot on our agenda. My own list would include a quicker end to our involvement in Afghanistan, movement to amend the Constitution with negation of the Supreme Court's now infamous "Citizens United" decision, continuing evolution of "Obamacare" toward truly universal health care (i.e., "Medicare for ALL"), Immigration Reform, and the restoration of Glass Steagall regulations to harness future Wall Street abuses. Your California Democratic Party At Work

Caucus meetings, procedural debates, endless discussion of rules, challenges and ripostes regarding resolutions, major divisions over new CDP regions, debates about *debates*—that's your California Democratic Party at work.

Until becoming active with the CDP several years ago, I never imagined what goes on behind the scenes. So I thought you might enjoy my entirely subjective account of the November 16-18 Executive Board weekend in Millbrae.

Background: The CDP has nine standing committees, 19 interest-based caucuses (I belong to five) and five current statewide or geographically-chartered organizations (I'm a charter member of the new California Armenian-American Democrats.) I'm also an officer (Central Trustee) of the California Democratic Council—the blanket organization of California's Democratic Clubs. With all those subsets plus the weekend's general sessions, meetings are inevitably cross-scheduled and attendees must choose between conflicting events.

After adjourning Friday's public hearing of the Mariposa Planning Commission, I left for the Millbrae Westin, site of the E-board. Friday was travel day with only a few caucus meetings, Voter Services Committee and Organizational Development Committee scheduled. The 60-year-old CDC met that evening with an in-depth discussion of re-structuring the organization; hard to believe I attended my first CDC convention 37 years ago at age 17! After that meeting ended, I met at 10:30PM with friends (networking, horse-trading and old-fashioned negotiation are always critically important parts of the weekends) for a late dinner. Believe it or not my first meal of the day.

Saturday: Rural Caucus at 8:00AM, under Chris Stampolis' dynamic leadership (Chris, incidentally, had appointed me as

Trustee of the CDC many years ago when he led THAT organization. See? Cross-pollination!) Wide-ranging discussions included reaching voters in rural areas despite limited infrastructure and much more. I then sat in on the final portion of the ADEM Convener workshop. With the AD rep elections coming up in January I proposed a Mariposa location for that important event for the southern portion of our massive CDP Region to benefit all our Yosemite Democrats. My proposal was met positively; private discussion followed. Then off to the 11:00 AM General Session, while chatting with (among many others) CDP Vice-Chair Eric Bauman, who many of you will remember as our highly motivating speaker at our Jefferson Dinner in 2009.

The General Session began (characteristically) late—with 163 credentialed E-Board members. Reports, speakers, post-election analysis and glad-handing under always-irascible, usually-profane California political legend and CDP Chair John Burton; John's progressive leadership has led the CDP aggressively and positively forward in a way that should make us all proud. From there my good friend Dr. Jan Black and I went to the invitation-only coffee with California Insurance Commissioner Dave Jones who—as usual—wanted to know what's happening in Mariposa. I'll keep you posted on Dave's "Insurance Rate Public Justification and Accountability Act"—a November 2014 ballot proposition which we must absolutely help pass. Chatted with many, including our own wise Susan Rowe, with whom I usually spend much convention/e-board time.

3:30 PM Progressive Caucus meeting included a joint presentation with the Armenian-Americans on genocide; as a member of both groups, but representing the Progressive Caucus back in San Diego in February, I helped negotiate a very sensitive and divisive issue between the two groups which ultimately led to this afternoon's event. I offered an opening line to Progressive Caucus Southern VP Mike Thaller, who chaired for ailing chair Karen Bernal.

Luckily my line worked—all that more fortunate because Mike attributed my line to me BEFORE using it and if it had bombed, egg on MY face. The discussion included two highly distinguished progressive guest panelists: David Barsamian (prolific writer, broadcaster and founder of the Boulder-based "Alternative Radio"—as well as longtime collaborator with Noam Chomsky) and Michael Parenti (famed writer, historian and social critic.) After the session, I privately shared my Armenian and professional background with Barsamian, who insisted upon autographing one of his books to me with "Les is more." He asked me to follow-up our personal discussion as soon as possible, which I will. I was invited to dinner with him but had to decline as I was immediately due at the meeting of the Disabilities Caucus, which I serve as an officer.

Two factions of the Disabilities Caucus have opposing sets of candidates for all officer positions in our upcoming April elections except mine: I'm running unopposed, strangely! That meeting ran well beyond its two-hour time-frame, but Jan kindly waited for me as we had planned a late dinner. She's a distinguished professor of International Studies at the Monterey Institute and a board director of Amnesty International; traveling the globe literally and constantly always makes her a fascinating conversation partner. We shared a dinner table with a State Senate legislative aide who had 15 years of remarkable insight. Others joined us during the meal but sitting at the next table throughout was Region 9 Director and Democratic National Committee member Shawn Bagley; Shawn had been elected to the one open DNC position at our Anaheim E-board in July from a field of 150 candidates. Shawn had actively pursued (and received) my endorsement and of course I'm sure THAT'S why he won! During dinner, Shawn helped himself to Jan's fries and I reciprocated by helping myself to Shawn's Crown Royal (neat.) Hey—it was a long day!

Sunday morning: a portion of a UC Berkeley musical based upon



Yosemite Dems remember Hilary and husband Kip from their attendance at our Cajun Feasts. Hilary introduced me to the student cast after their performance; I told them about performing my one-man show at UC Berkeley's Durham Theatre 33 years ago and they seemed nearly impressed.

Then: the final plenary session—the final 10 negotiated resolutions (including mine re: the Yosemite Visitors Center in Mariposa which gratefully passed by acclamation) were presented, as well as the weekend's full Legislation Committee meeting report, Rules Committee meeting report—including the proposed rules for our April, 2013 CDP Convention—and one of the more contentious reports: the presentation of the new maps for our new CDP Regions: the outline for the physical areas of California by which the party proposes to organize us (by combined Assembly Districts.) Due to the size of some of the new ADs, some regions are immense: and though a revised map was presented after weekend haggling, factions were still not pleased. That map passed but only upon the condition that bylaws changes would be presented to the body at our convention to add regions, potentially divide the two largest CDP regions—and then enact it all via voting at our next CDP convention and E-board. Semi-newsflash: our current CDP region is 7 and our new one will be 5. For now, at least!

After adjournment, I drove the 3+ hours home in time for a late dinner—fulfilled with the knowledge of another successful weekend of accomplishment by our CDP. A whirlwind weekend about which I hope I've brought to you some elucidation.
