Did You Know that 30% of Americans Live in Poverty, Even After Government Transfers? By Ben Leet

I taught in the public schools of Oakland for about 18 years before moving up to the beautiful mountains. East Oakland, an extensive flatland, was and still is an extensive poverty swath. At my school, around 80% of the children qualified for free lunches, a federal program that stipulates the parents' income can be no more than 130% of the poverty threshold (not above \$33,258 for a fourperson family in 2015).

As a result, I've taken an interest in the Supplemental Poverty Measure, the SPM, from the U. S. Census and also remedies to relieve poverty. The Census published the SPM just last week; it is released concurrently with the "official" poverty report every September. It is six years old and takes into account "many of the government programs designed to assist low-income families and individuals that are not included in the current official poverty measure.

The U.S.A can boast of an after-tax income of over \$43,000 for every human being, according to the <u>BEA.gov</u> web page, Table 2.1. We are extraordinarily prosperous. Normally we would think that the average income for a family of four would be around \$170,000—presuming that the average would have half above and half below average. But the median—the dividing point where half are below and half are above—is \$72,520 for four-person households, and 56% of U.S. children live in households with less than \$51,166 for a four-person household, which is less than a third of the "average." In fact, 80% of Americans live with incomes below 60% of the "average."

When a current supervisor of Mariposa County spoke before election with the Mariposa Democrats at the Miners' Inn, he said that he had walked about his district visiting every house and shaking hands, and his first observation was that he had never 30% of Americans Live in Poverty (continued)

believed there was so much poverty in this county. Mariposa County registers 16.2% in poverty, Madera 22.3%, and Fresno 27.5%, and all of California 20.6%, the highest rate in the nation. "Without safety net resources, 38.1% of children would live in poverty," states the Public Policy Institute of California.

Nationally the poverty rate, from the SPM, stands at 14.3%, down from last year's 15.0%. It shows that senior poverty was reduced by Social Security from 48% to 14%, better than last year when the numbers were 50.0% to 14.4%. The report details the number of Americans who are lifted from poverty by the social benefit programs of credits, in kind stipends, and cash. Another Congressional Budget Office report on income (in 2011) states that 6% of income is transferred by Social Security, 4% by Medicare, 2% by Medicaid, and 2% all other cash and in kind assistance—a total of 14%—but for safety net programs to the poor, only 4%.

The government does have programs that benefit the wealthiest among us. The reduced tax rate on capital income, the pension income tax deduction, and the mortgage interest payment tax deduction are programs that benefit the wealthiest households.

Why, I hope you are asking, does the title above state that 30% of Americans are living in poverty even after the transfers? The SPM states it as 14.3%. It has to do with the definition of poverty being too low. Last year the chief author of the SPM was Kathleen Short, a decades-long veteran of the U.S. Census. She had published many other papers, and one, Nov. 2013, stated, "The overall poverty rate [for 2012] using the updated modified family budget thresholds was 30.0 percent." This suggests that families with resources below approximately 140 percent of the SPM threshold, rather than 200 percent, may be characterized as not able to meet their basic needs and achieve a safe and decent standard of living, or as families with 'low income' (November 2013, page 2). The 2014 SPM shows that 32% of Americans live with an income of less than 150% of the poverty level, and are "not able to meet their basic needs," as stated by K. Short.

The SPM, page 14, shows that 51 million were lifted from poverty by support programs—that is 16% of the population—meaning that the safety net programs with Social Security decreased the poverty rate from 30% to 14.3%. K. Short implies that the poverty (or low income) rate is 46%, and it's reduced to 30% by government programs.

As every Democrat knows, the Republicans plan to slash funding to the poverty programs. The Center for Budget and Policy Priorities states 62% of all program cuts will come from programs serving the poor, and that these programs will shrink by 42% in the next ten years. This budget has Congressman McClintock's support, so a vote for Bob Derlet is in order.

Inequality is excessive in our country, our home. The top-earning 10% of households received 50.5% of all pre-tax income in 2015, and the top 1% received 22%. The lower 55% received 16% of all income. Wages are too low, and it's too easy to slip into poverty, and difficult to lift oneself out. I hope these details help Democrats to perceive and argue intelligently if they come across doubters who consider the poverty measures as giveaways, ineffective, bad ideas, or just too expensive. You might show this essay to a younger adult who knows better than we older folk know. Not since surveys began in 1888 have 31% of citizens, in the age group 18 to 34, lived with their parents in this nation.

Some years ago a French friend of mine, during a discussion about political events in France at that time, described the average French voter as "nihilistic." Derived from the Latin word *nihil* meaning *nothing*, one interpretation could and should be *indifference*.

At that particular point in time, the French government was undergoing an upheaval such as could be compared with the traumatic revolution that cast out their monarchy: a new replacement of their chief executive seemed to be stepping up to their podium every other month. Yet one outstanding characteristic seemed to dominate the scene, that of the average French man or woman steadfastly going about their personal business with little or no interest in the political turmoil.

Here in the United States of America, we see many examples of such indifference today as a substantial percentage of eligible citizens fail to exercise their franchise to vote. In some cases, especially the mid-term elections, the turnout has been as low as 34 or 35 percent. What a different election this current run for the President of the United States would be if we were to overcome that tendency.

Of course, there are a number of ways to achieve higher percentages of participation in the electoral process, one of them being the use of force. But this is the USA, and we don't do business that way. Another might be to use incentives such as offering rewards, but that could and probably would open a Pandora's Box of "purchased votes." Yet to offer a small personal tax deduction with proof of having voted would certainly carry considerable weight, perhaps even going so far as to tip the The Nihilistic Voter (continued)

balance. I understand that in Australia every registered voter is required by law to cast a vote. What their proposed punishment for failure is I have no idea, there seems to be little in the way of publicity about this practice, yet it seems to achieve the desired goal.

The outcome of nihilism or indifference with accompanying failure to show up at the polls is, of course, the loss of persons of quality among those ultimately winning the election. Not just at the highest level of government service but also at the merest small town mayoral or supervisory position. Invariably the loudest voices seem to win, in many cases promising unbelievable benefits even with little or no possibility of such promises coming to pass.

Yes there are persons of dedication elected to office, devoted to those who they represent, exercising the utmost care in their daily duties, but these rare individuals appear to be either increasingly unable to influence their colleagues or find their voices drowned out by the noise of demagogues.

I hate to place an extra burden on the registrar's office, but it does seem possible that a gentle reminder that everyone's vote is important could make some impact. Or, perhaps an advertising blitz shortly before election day emphasizing the importance of casting votes. The only answer lies in a strong, coordinated effort to encourage all citizens to register and to show up at the polls no matter what their affiliation. And education is the key.

Mariposa Meeting Report By Cameron Burley

Robin Hopper, superintendent of the Mariposa County Unified School District, spoke to the Mariposa Democratic Club September 10 about proposition L, a bond issue funding school facilities' repair and upgrade. Mariposa schools have way too much deferred maintenance. She illustrated the need with pictures of well-worn buildings including one building with a long-time tarp over a roof awaiting roof repair.

Also needed are upgrades with electrical modernizing and new air conditioners. These buildings mostly precede the computer age and some are so-called temporary buildings that are expensive to heat and cool.

The proceeds of the bond issue are restricted to building maintenance and related issues; none can go to operating expenses such as teacher salaries.

Hopper also presented financial data including the obvious question of: how much will our taxes go up? The answer is \$49 per \$100,000 of assessed value. Note that assessed value often is well below market value. Check your last tax bill for assessed value.

There was some concern about the ballot also containing Proposition 51, a state bond issue for school maintenance. Robin's answer is that Mariposa needs both. The state money requires matching local funds. If we don't pass our bond issue, there will be no matching local funds and the state money will go elsewhere.

After Robin's presentation, the Mariposa Club voted to endorse Proposition L.
